

COMMODORE'S COLUMN

I hope everyone enjoyed the Christmas/New Year break and is ready to take on new challenges this year. The Club has been busy with our Melbourne members catching up with old friends as well as visitors to Metung coming to the restaurant. Remember members get priority if you book ahead for the restaurant. Sailing has been active with our biggest fleet of 17 boats for the season being registered for the Legacy Regatta around Raymond Island Race held in early January. A significant amount of money was also raised for local Legacy projects.

The Club hosted a 420 Association dinghy event from 4-8 January which had 13 entrants. It was well supported by the Association with the Club providing some rescue vessels and Club facilities. The standard of young sailors was very high and everyone enjoyed the Metung experience.

It was with some relief the Club was finally able to hold the 2019-20 Sailing Season Presentation Night which Covid19 restrictions had previously made untenable. The night was well attended and enjoyable. Congratulations to Tom Moore and his crew who won the prestigious Club Championship in 'Harmony'. The full season results are available on our website.

Metung 11 has been undergoing some serious engine repairs and is back running. It performed well during the Australia Day Regatta.

The Club hosted the Etchells Eastern Region Championship in conjunction with the Dragon Association over the long weekend. Seven races were held in near ideal condition for the 17 boats that entered. Nigel Abbot in 'The Archer' was first followed by Jeff Rose in 'War of the Roses'. Brandon Kibby crewed on the winning boat and his local knowledge proved beneficial. Well done all. Fred Haes in 'Imagination' took the honours in the 3 fleet Dragon Class.

I want to thank all the volunteers who gave up their long weekend to make the Regatta a success. It took some 24 volunteers in all to organise the event and around 13 each day out on the water.

A meeting was held recently with the Shire to discuss the process of renewing the lease for the Club which expires in March 2024. Options are being examined to safeguard our tenure over the site and minimise increases in costs. The process appears lengthy and complex. There is a need to hold working bees around the Club and also on Metung 11. Further details will be provided in our weekly newsletter. Please help share the load among members if you can.

VALE GAI CLOUGH

Gai's achievements in life were quite outstanding. After leaving school she became a nurse and met Les at 18 whilst working at The Alfred Hospital. By 26 she was Director of Nursing at a new hospital in Chadstone and at 28 they had set up their own small surgical hospital. At 33 she was running a 40 bed hospital in Essendon.

Gai was a leader in Industrial Relations and was the Private Hospital representative in the Arbitration Commission of Victoria. Her innovations in staff management co-operation are common place today.

She was a member of the Australian College of Health Service

Administration, Aust Institute of Management and had a Masters of Business in Administration.

Her major sport was sailing and Gai was the first female Commodore of a Royal Yacht Squadron (Royal Melbourne YS). Her considerable contribution to RMYS includes her founding of the Australian Women's Keelboat Regatta in 1991. Thirteen boats participated in the first AWKR and it has been conducted every June long weekend since then (except 2020 due to COVID!). In 2019 forty boats entered and 250 sailors attended the regatta dinner. The

30th AWKR will be held in 2021 and no doubt many more after that, what a wonderful legacy.



Gai sailed two Sydney Hobarts, the Darwin Ambon Indonesia Race, Melbourne-Hobart and Melbourne-Devonport races, won two Australian J24 Championships and represented Australia in the Worlds in 1996. She sailed in New Zealand, USA, Buenos Aires, Dubai and Japan. Gai's wealth of experience has been an incredible asset to us here in Metung. She has been an integral member of our club for the past ten years and has been Vice Commodore, Committee Member and Race Officer. She was heavily involved in Race Management, tirelessly volunteering and was a great friend to many.

Gai had been fighting cancer for 20 years when she passed away in December. She will be sorely missed and fondly remembered

ONE DESIGN REGATTA - ETHELLES & DRAGONS

Over the Australia Day weekend the 31st East Gippsland International Etchells Class Championships were held at MYC also incorporating the International Dragon Class Regatta. Many thanks again to all the Volunteers, Keels on Wheels who were principal sponsor, Helen Crossley Arts Studio and Julie-Anne McPherson Photography for all their time, support and sponsorship.

The regatta attracted boats from Tasmania and Melbourne and was seen as a great precursor and warmup for the both the International Etchells, and International Dragons Victorian Championships. Both will be held by Metung Yacht Club over Labor Day weekend in March. If border restrictions are lifted, it is expected some 30 boats are likely to attend including the likes of America's Cup winner John Bertrand. In addition to this, Metung will also be hosting the International Cadet Victorian Championships where many of Metung Yacht Club Juniors will be participating. Race Officer Jacque Crawford was able to get all 17 boats and crews off and complete 3 races in a light South Easterly breeze on the Saturday. Nigel Abbot skippering "The Archer" along with Tom Dwyer and Brandon Kibby won all three races. War of the Roses skippered by Jeff Rose, Excite skippered by Toby Richardson from Royal Yacht Club of Tasmania and Tamm Ha Tamm skippered by Christian Baillot from Royal Brighton Yacht Club finished the day with only 2 points separating all 3.

Light winds on Sunday delayed the start until a nice South Easterly wind settled and held. Again three races were able to be held. The dominance of The Archer crew from the first day was broken with Excite winning the 4th race and War of the Roses winning the 5th race. However, The Archer again made its presence felt by winning the last race of the day. At the end of Sunday's racing bar, a major incident The Archer had all but wrapped up the series, but leaving 3 boats, War of the Roses, Excite and Tamm Ha Tamm separated by only 2 points.

This meant that Race 7 on Monday was basically a shootout for the minor places. By the first mark Tamm Ha Tamm by had 2 boats between themselves and War of the Roses, with Excite a further 2 places back and looked strong at the time to take 2nd place overall. By the 2nd Mark, War of the Roses had narrowed that lead to just 1, and by the

finish had worked their way back to be right behind Tamm Ha Tamm who ended up winning race 7. By virtue of a count back War of the Roses finished 2nd overall, With Tamm Ta Tamm 3rd and Excite 4th overall.

SAILING TIPS - Small things can have a big impact in a race

1. Make all your lines as short as possible, this reduces weight and minimizes the number of tangles you'll get. Use a magic marker or piece of tape to mark important settings on each sheet.
2. Minimize twists in the spinnaker halyard tail by tying the end to a fixed point. All your halyards, especially the main, will stretch, so you may have to tighten them occasionally.
3. A rolled sail guarantees it will last longer, take your time and do it right to prevent kinks and bends. If under postponement on the water, roll them up and keep them out of the sun and if you have to leave them up, prevent them from flogging.
4. Use shock cord to hold hiking straps as close to normal hiking position as possible, this will ensure that you won't have to reach into the bilge searching for the strap with your toes after every tack.
5. Wrapping tape around parts of the rigging is really important to stop inadvertent unravelling or pins coming loose. However, seeing little tape ends that have come unstuck and are flapping in the breeze is bad. To prevent this, put silicone sealant over the ends of the tape but make sure you use as little tape as possible.
6. Adjust your mainsheet cam so the jaws are just below the mainsheet when you are trimming it from a hiked-out position. You want the cam low enough so the sheet won't automatically go into the cam but you want the cam high enough so you can use your foot to get the sheet in the cam temporarily.

7. Don't leave lines in a cam cleat as this wears out the springs. Use metal instead of plastic cam cleats because these hold better and last longer plus you can even sharpen them when they begin to wear.
8. Clear the weeds from your centreboard and rudder just before the start. On a keelboat, you'll have to back down to do this. If you have an engine, don't set your prop too early in light air because you may need some help to get to the favoured end of the line before the preparatory signal.
9. Read the Sailing Instructions before getting to the starting area. Concentrate on courses, recall procedure, shortened course, protest requirements and any other sections where the committee may have modified standard procedure. Always encourage your crew to read the instructions as well.
10. Use magnetic tape or yarn for sail telltales and sail repair tape is the best way to stick telltales to the sail. Make it easy to tell which telltale is on which side by using red yarn on port and green on starboard with the starboard telltales a little higher.
11. Before and during the race, there are certain things you should record for future reference. These include wind direction, the order of marks, compass course to marks, and heading on each tack. Use a grease pencil to write anywhere on fibreglass because it's easily erasable and still works when the boat is wet.
12. Sailors, like all athletes, need water to keep from getting dehydrated, get a water bottle with a spout and put it in a place where it's easy for the crew to reach. Encourage everyone to drink, both before and during the race.
13. Start the race with your bilge as dry as possible. In windy conditions, if you are planning to sail the race with your thru-hull bailers open, you may have to close them while luffing before the start.
14. Your best source of good ideas is other sailors. Talk to the competitors in your fleet, and spend some time perusing their boats and their setups. You will definitely come away with a few new ideas, tricks and techniques.

HOW TO USE THE QR CODE

Our Club is required to provide a QR Code to enable COVID Registration at the Club for contact tracing purposes.

MAN OVERBOARD DRILL

An incident during a recent Twilight race is a timely reminder to practice your 'man overboard' drill.



It's a good idea to practice your 'man overboard' drill often.

What to do if someone falls overboard

1. Most importantly, do not jump in after them
2. Shout "man overboard" to alert the start
3. Throw a lifebuoy ring, horseshoe or lifejacket to them
4. Check your bearings relative to prominent landmarks if available. Mark where the event occurred on a map, GPS or chart plotter. This will assist if a search is required
5. Keep them in sight at all times. Ask someone on board to point continuously at the person in the water for the reference of the master and others on board who may be preparing equipment or other head-down activities
6. Turn the boat toward the side they fell from (if the person is close to the propeller, put the motor in neutral or switch off the motor to avoid striking them with a turning propeller).

How to recover a person overboard

1. Position the vessel to bring the person alongside, preferably into wind
2. Stop engines to avoid striking them with a turning propeller
3. Help the person into the vessel, preferably over the stern, as a small vessel might capsize or take water if you try taking them in over the side. On yachts with overhanging sterns, they should be pulled in at the lowest point of freeboard. Consider installing a boarding ladder on your vessel
4. Ropes, a sail or blanket may be passed under them in the water and used to lift and roll them back into the vessel
5. A person recovered from the water may be hurt, cold or exhausted. Keep them lying down if at all possible. Our [COVID website](#) [www.metungyachtclub.com](#) has information on how to treat the effects of cold shock and hypothermia.
